### 1. READINESS FOR CHANGE

When asking teachers to change their practice, it is helpful to first assess their readiness for change and the aspects of the school culture that might inhibit or promote this readiness. No matter how good leaders' pedagogical knowledge and problem-solving ability may be, their ability to effect change and improvement will be compromised if relations with the school are characterizelahesdy is impandateablemelerstions, how they influence student achievement and what principals can do.

Principals have a significant positive effect on teacher beliefs when they:

- help to clarify the reasons for implementing the policy
- empower teachers to participate in decisions about how the policy will be implemented

- What do you need to know about the person before starting the conversation?
- What other perspectives or interpretations of the situation might you want to consider?
